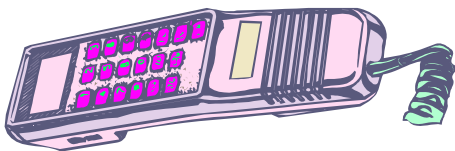

I shipped eleven (11) packages to the 3-17 CAV the unit we have adopted and I am waiting to hear from Cpt Erik Wright. Cpt Wright is my contact there and I ship all the packages to him. The North Bellmore Post collected and gave me 5 boxes of items to send and Quentin Roosevelt Post gave me 3 boxes. I received a lot of items from PCC Ken Cadieux and then I repackage the items for shipment. I send two packages to individual servicemen and eleven packages to the 3-17 CAV. This unit has been in Iraq for about 3 months. The packages must be addressed to an individual and that person then distributes the items. This unit is a Blackhawk Helicopter group out of Ft Drum, NY.

Shingles Vaccine Available through TRICARE

FALLS CHURCH, Va. - Following a Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommendation on October 19, 2007, TRICARE now covers Zostavax, the vaccine designed to prevent shingles for beneficiaries 60 and older.

Shingles is a painful viral disease that affects more than one million Americans every year. More than half of those cases happen in people age 60 or older. The CDC recommends a single dose of shingles vaccine for everyone age 60 and older.

In a shingles prevention study done by the Veterans Administration Cooperative Trial, run by Dr. Michael Oxman out of the University of California, San Diego, Zostavax was more than 50 percent effective in reducing the incidence of shingles and more than 60 percent effective in reducing some of its associated symptoms. Even in people who suffer from the disease, most of those who were vaccinated experienced less pain.

Beneficiaries who receive the shingles vaccine after October 19, 2007, must have vaccinations administered in a provider's office. Zostavax is covered under the TRICARE medical benefit and is not reimbursable under the pharmacy benefit. Beneficiaries with coverage or claims questions should contact the TRICARE regional claims processor found on their beneficiary explanation of benefits (EOB) notice, or if living overseas contact the local TRICARE Service Center or the TRICARE Area Office for the area in which they live.

More Loans for Veteran Business Owners

VA Secretary Correction

In last month’s “Veterans News”, I reported that Paul J. Hunter was confirmed as the new Secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs. In fact Paul J. Hutter was named the new General Counsel, not Secretary. As of today Gordon H. Mansfield is still the Acting Secretary. President Bush has nominated Lt. Gen. James B. Peake, retired Army Surgeon General, to the position of Secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

DIABETES REPORT

The VA released a report in November stating that 25% of all VA patients are living with diabetes. While “Veterans News” has often reminded Vietnam veterans that service in Vietnam is a presumptive cause of this disease and others the new report suggests that it is important for our older vets to get tested for the disease. Many reservists and national Guardsman in their 40s and 50s are being activated for the war in Iraq/Afghanistan. If the disease is discovered while on active duty or within 12 months of discharge the veteran is eligible for monthly compensation and life long medical treatment.

Governor Appoints New Veterans Director

Governor Eliot Spitzer has appointed Retired Army Colonel James D. McDonough as Director of the state’s Division of Veterans Affairs replacing George Basher. McDonough, a graduate of the State University of New York at Plattsburg, has Masters Degrees from Indiana State University and the United States Army War College. A veteran of Operation Iraqi Freedom, he served as Battalion Commander of the 3’d Battalion, 43’d Air Defense Artillery Regiment in Fort Bliss Texas and previously served as a Professor at the United States Military Academy.

A new statute took effect last week. It creates two new crimes for DWI offenders who kill.

One is aggravated vehicular homicide, a felony that carries a maximum penalty of 8 1/2 to 25 years in prison.

The other is aggravated vehicular assault which carries a max of 5 to 15 years.

Coalition, Legion Award 1,000 Grants

Disabled Iraq, Afghanistan vets receive holiday cash

INDIANAPOLIS (Dec. 21, 2007) - The American Legion has distributed or processed 1,000 grants to disabled veterans this holiday season thanks to a \$500,000 donation from the The Coalition to Salute America's Heroes.

"The grants are gone, but the need to care for those who have borne the cost of battle remains," said National Commander Marty Conatser. "I am grateful to the Coalition for this generous gift. These vets certainly deserve it."

Any veteran who incurred a 30-percent or more disability while serving in the theater of operations during Operation Enduring Freedom or Operation Iraqi Freedom was eligible for a \$500 grant. The American Legion assumed all distribution and administrative costs so the entire Coalition donation was awarded to the veterans.

"These grants were just a small token of appreciation for the sacrifices made by so many of America's men and women in uniform," said Thomas J. Palma, general manager of the Coalition. "The American Legion is a well-respected organization with a presence in communities across America. Legion service officers did a great job in fording deserving veterans and processing the grants."

It was not the first time that the two organizations have teamed up to award grants to disabled veterans. The American Legion distributed checks for the Coalition in 2005.

"The program was so successful two years ago that The American Legion's National Executive Committee unanimously passed a resolution at our last convention authorizing our assistance in this great endeavor," Conatser said.

The awards were appreciated by many of the recipients. "I recently received a grant from the Legion. You have no idea what this has meant to me. It has been a great aid to my family and it just puts special warmth in me to know that there are good people out there that appreciate the sacrifice and work young and old people have given to preserve what is good about our home," said one recipient from Mt. Laurel, N.J. "I was not expecting this and it is with a joyful heart that I give you all my sincerest thanks, you made my family's Christmas. May God bless all of you."

LEGACY FUND MOTORCYCLE RUN

American Legion National Commander Marty Conatser will kick-off The American Legion Legacy Run, which will begin with a national gathering of The American Legion Riders at American Legion Post 64, 602 S. Holt Road, in Indianapolis. The riders will depart on Sunday, August 17, 2008, & thunder through Illinois, Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico to Phoenix and the site of the 90th American Legion National Convention.

The riders, many of them members of The American Legion Family, will journey for five grueling days to make possible a college education for the children of comrades who died defending our freedoms since the attacks of September 11, 2001.

The goal for 2008 is to raise at least \$350,000 for The American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund.

"As an unfortunate consequence of America's war on terror, many children of our active-duty military personnel are now members of single-parent families," Conatser said. "In most cases, this also means their chances to attend college have greatly diminished. Children of military personnel who die on active service are entitled to receive some money toward a college education. It is the least a grateful nation can do."

The American Legion Legacy Fund has already distributed \$74,000 in critically needed scholarship assistance to students enrolled in college level courses since 2004, including \$36,000 in 2007.

"We will ensure that higher education will be a reality for these families," Conatser said. "Providing for the children our military personnel have left behind is our civic duty, and an education is a powerful way to show our thanks."
